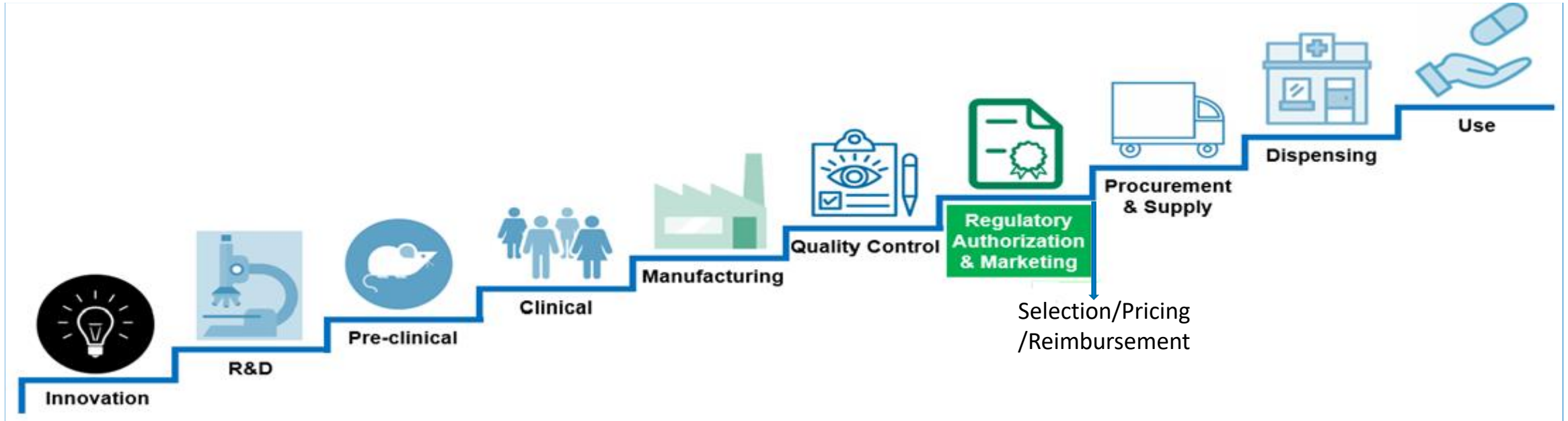

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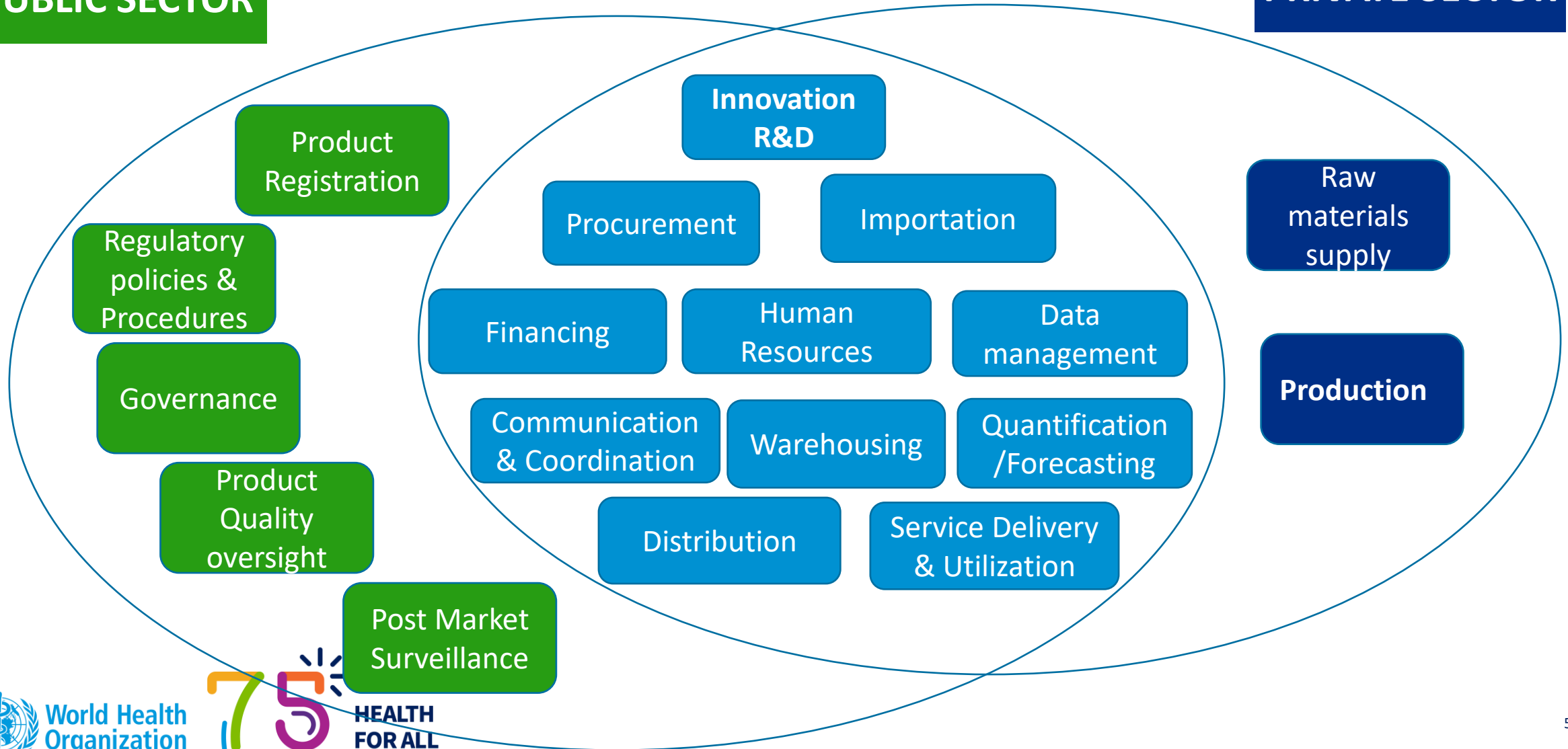
Problem Statement

- Limited access to safe and high-quality health products
- > 80% of supply supported by donors in mainly LICs
- Weak regulatory oversight
- Frequent stockouts
- Weak Governance and unsustainable Finance
- Public procurement as main mean to secure access to and delivery of safe and affordable health products
- Weak storage and distribution systems of quality-assured medical products

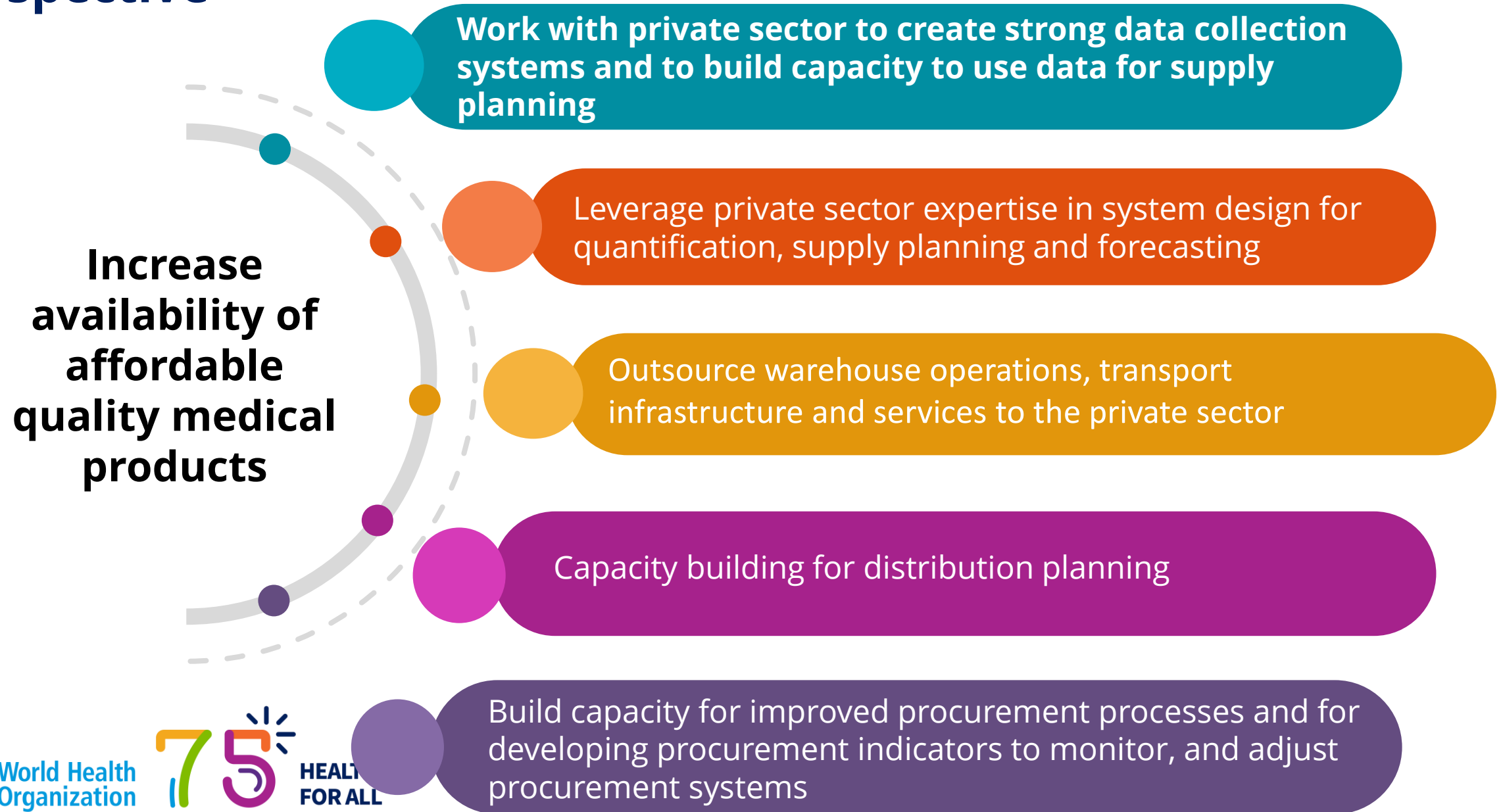

Private Sector Engagement from a Health System Strengthening Perspective

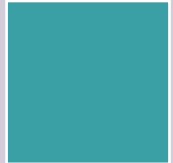


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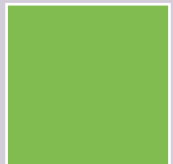
Ensure quality of health products and improve effective use

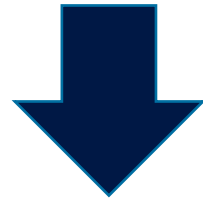
